














AWARDING SCHOLARSHIPS THAT GIVE RISE TO HOPE

The Rotary Scholarship program is an acclaimed cornerstone of the club. Scholarship winners are exceptional students who often are the first in their families to attend college and come from households that earn less than \$20,000 per year. Last year, LA5 received over 150 applications from some of the best and brightest minds in Southern California. The club awarded about \$160,000 in new scholarships, the most in LA5's 104-year history, to 40 recipients. These young leaders will attend Brown University, Princeton, MIT, Harvard, UCLA, U.C. Berkeley, Stanford, Wellesley, and many other esteemed institutions.

Members host small groups for lunch at their place of business and discuss current issues in their industry or profession. The lunches include dynamic talks from various LA5 members and raise funds for the Paul Harris Society.

Chartered in 1909 as one of the first five Rotary clubs, Rotary Club of Los Angeles LA5 has over 400 business and professional leaders who live or work in the Los Angeles area. One of the most active Rotary Clubs in the world, LA5 contributes approximately \$500,000 annually to worthy causes.

The Rotary Club of Los Angeles International Projects



Providing Humanity and Dignity to Mental Health Patients in Sri Lanka

Sri Lanka's Angoda Mental Hospital Forensic Ward, which houses 120 prisoners with mental health illnesses, was a tightly confined facility in a state of horrific disrepair. Despite the inhumane conditions, many prisoners were not allowed to leave the ward – one inmate had not set foot on the earth outside in over 50 years. LA5 partnered with Battamarula Rotary Club in Colombo (Sri Lanka's capital) to rehabilitate the ward. The project included repainting walls and ceilings, cleaning unsanitary floors, repairing and repainting beds, and replacing soiled mattresses with new ones. With a budget of US\$16,140 and a matching grant, the project created dignified living conditions for the patients of Angoda.



Helping Orphans in One of Asia's Poorest Countries

Myanmar (formerly Burma) has over 200 orphanages. Severe health problems-cholera dysentery, typhoid, and more - plague the children in these centers due to a lack of clean water and sanitation. In 2005, J.T. Warring of LA5, with the support of the Rotary Foundation, founded the Myanmar Orphanages Water Systems Project. Since then, the project has produced complete water management systems for 22 Myanmar orphanages, with more on the immediate horizon. Although Myanmar ousted all service clubs in 1977, Rotary International has gained traction with the current government, thanks to the success of the Myanmar Orphanages Water Systems Project and the work of LA5's members.

LA5 will continue to be the lead club, with J.T. Warring as the spearhead, for this community and life-changing project.



Generosity That Is Improving Health and Mobility in Puerto Rico


Thirteen LA5 members, plus four family members, joined 75 other local Rotarians in Puerto Rico for a project to provide solar power for a community-run aqueduct that serves a rural community and elementary school. Another project provided Spanish/English dictionaries to all of Puerto Rico's 4th graders in public schools (21,000 students). Additionally, in conjunction with other Rotary Clubs, LA5 has spent over \$1.2 million on the purchase and distribution of wheelchairs for people across the globe. In 2012, the wheelchair project focused on Puerto Rico with the same LA5 team mentioned above.



The Rotary Club of Los Angeles Community Service

Helping Communities Across Los Angeles Thrive

LA5 enabled the Angel City Giveaway by helping secure a cease fire between gangs near the project site. The Giveaway peacefully distributed over 3,000 toys, 7,000 pieces of clothing, 1,000 food certificates, and school supplies to over 3,000 recipients. For the Spark of Love project, LA5 procured \$17,500 worth of toys, which were distributed to over 2,400 L.A. County foster youth and children in need. Through LA5's Children's Court Committee, the club continues to provide last resort funding—for everything from prom dresses to dental work—to foster children who have no other resources.

LA5 helped fund their camp fees plus purchase the necessary clothes and supplies to enjoy the experience.

LA5 Scholars have studied on every continent except for Antarctica. Additionally, LA5 also participates in Rotary's World Peace Fellows program. Rotary has established six Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution at universities around the world. World Peace Fellows may earn either a Master's Degree (for younger academics) or a Professional Development Certificate (for current leaders). 
Wine Tasting Cruise August 20, 2011

- RCLA Foundation Investments are managed by Morgan Stanley Smith Barney (MSSB). (Figure 1)
- The asset allocation of the Endowment portfolio (as of 6/30/12) is depicted graphically in Figure 2.
- The Foundation Board has established an Investment Policy Statement that covers all of the investment accounts.
- The Foundation Board approved a reduction in the payout rate from 5% to 4% of the prior 3-year average effective 7/1/12.
- MSSB began managing the assets on 1/4/08, at the very beginning of the *Great Recession*.






Annual Operating Budget: \$515,000




Rotary International
